

Medical Coverage	The US Healthcare system is entirely privatized, and healthcare is extremely expensive. There are no government programs that reduce healthcare costs for international students and students can often be required to pay out of pocket for healthcare expenses if they cannot provide the doctor or hospital with a valid health insurance card issued by a US based health insurance company.
	Semester Exchange students: Students not seeking a degree from NU are only required to meet the minimum health insurance standards as defined by the J-1 visa. More specific information will be provided on the exchange application website. NU health plan is highly recommended
	<b>Dual Degree Students:</b> All full-time degree seeking students are automatically enrolled in the NU health insurance plan (NUSHP), please go to <a href="www.northeastern.edu/nushp">www.northeastern.edu/nushp</a> for more information. Students, who prefer not to take this plan, must complete the waiver process in accordance with university deadlines. Waivers are only granted in the event that the students alternate health plan meets the following requirements:

Housing	Exchange students <u>are not required</u> to live on campus. Spaces for oncampus housing are <u>extremely limited</u> . If housing is available, it will be offered to those students on semester exchange or who will be going out on co-op placement first. If housing is available, applications will be done online separately from the traditional housing application site.
